As one of the finest pediatric hematology/oncology fellowship training programs in the nation, the Kiwanis Doernbecher Children's Cancer Program (KDCCP) has the power to change how we care for children with cancer. The Kiwanis Fellows receive intense clinical training in providing attentive and compassionate care to pediatric cancer patients. Equipped with clinical and research skills and a high degree of professionalism, they are well poised to become leaders in the field of pediatric hematology/oncology.

Caring for Children

Kiwanis Fellows oversee the hospital's oncology inpatient service. They run the hospital rounds and help direct the care for every single child with cancer admitted to Doernbecher. With more than 200 new diagnosed cancer and blood disorder patients each year from Oregon, southern Washington, Alaska and Idaho, Doernbecher is the only comprehensive pediatric cancer center in the region. The Kiwanis Fellows have a direct and meaningful impact on the lives of children with cancer.

Driving Research Discovery

As one of the top pediatric cancer programs in the nation, Doernbecher provides an excellent setting for fellows to receive specialized training experience in laboratory or clinical research. The comprehensive training program affords opportunities for fellows to work alongside renowned faculty physicians to gain valuable in-depth research experience. Without the foundation they develop here, our fellows would not be trained to conduct research that may one day lead to cures in cancer.

Your support is crucial.

Funding from government and hospital sources has decreased and the support of local Kiwanis groups has proven to be vital to the training of future pediatric cancer physician-scientists. Through your generosity we are able to train leaders with the expertise needed to carry on this important work.

Your philanthropic support also allows us to add other important options to the program, including:

- **A Masters in Clinical Research Program** which trains fellows to design and run clinical trials.
- **Annual trips to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania**, where they care for kids at children's hospital Jengo La Watoto and work with hospital staff to develop curriculum and improve their pediatric oncology unit. This program helps fellows understand the global impact of cancer and how treatments may differ depending on the country's resources.
- **Memberships to societies and travel to conferences**, which facilitate learning about the latest research from the world's experts, as well as networking with those experts to expand their research potential.

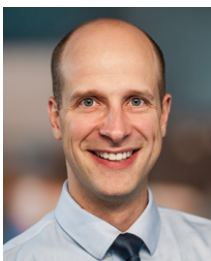

Oncology Service and Director of the PHO Fellowship Program, and he is an internationally recognized expert in Neuroblastoma.

Notably, Dr. Roberts graduated from Doernbecher's own Pediatric Hematology/Oncology Fellowship Program in 2004, a program funded by the Kiwanis Doernbecher Children's Cancer Program. In fact, he was the program's second-ever Fellow. We look forward to partnering with Dr. Roberts to further the mission of KDCCP and continue to bring important progress to pediatric cancer treatment.

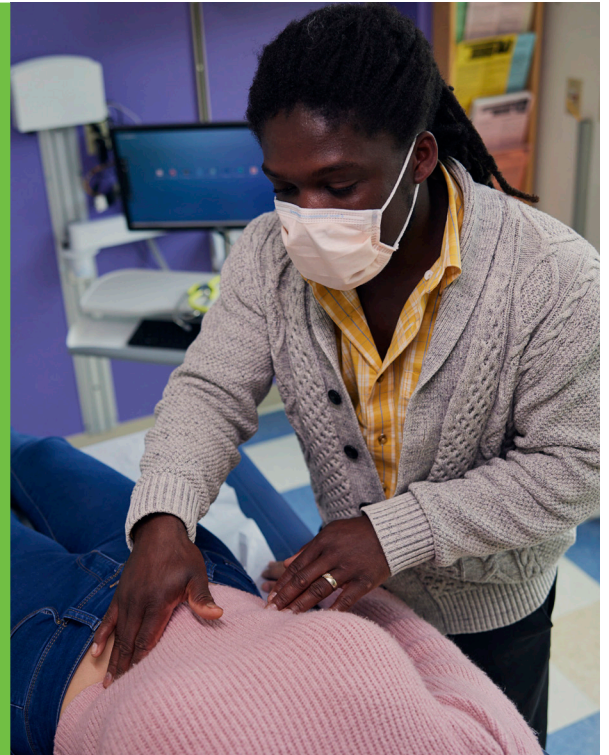
ADAM LAMBLE, M.D.



Following Dr. Lamble's graduation from the OHSU Pediatric Hematology/Oncology Fellowship Program in 2017, he joined Seattle Children's Hospital as Assistant Professor in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Washington School of Medicine and pediatric oncologist. Dr. Lamble's clinical and research interests focus on high-risk

hematologic malignancies and immune based therapies. He is a member of the Children's Oncology Group myeloid diseases committee and is currently leading multiple early phase clinical trials for pediatric patients with relapsed hematologic malignancies.
